Information for Baltimore City Residents on COVID-19 Vaccines* Written March 31, 2021. See link at bottom for weekly updates.

Why should I get the vaccine?

• COVID-19 vaccines are safe, protect you from getting sick with COVID-19, and reduce your chances of developing severe illness.

Do the vaccines cost anything?

No! They are free, and you don't need health insurance to get vaccinated.

HOW DO I FIND AN APPOINTMENT TO GET VACCINATED?

- Any Baltimore City resident 16 or older can complete a short, online
 Vaccination Interest Form here: http://bit.ly/bmorecovaxinterest
 (even if you aren't yet eligible) so the Baltimore City Health Department can contact you when vaccination appointments are available.
 If you don't have internet access, you can call here: 1-855-634-6829.
- Also check the CVS and Walgreens websites if eligible (see link 1 below)

What if I need Transportation?

• If you need a ride or funds for parking or public transportation: Try forwarding appointment confirmation to MDVaxRides@gmail.com and include: name, phone number, pickup address, vaccination site address, date + time of appointments.

Who should get the vaccine?

Everyone. The vaccines are effective for the general public, and are especially important for those at high risk, including those over 60 or who have: High Blood pressure, Heart conditions, Asthma (moderate-severe), Chronic Kidney Disease, Diabetes, Dementia, or other conditions listed at link 1 below.

Is it safe to get the vaccine?

- YES. And you cannot get COVID-19 from the vaccines.
- The most commonly reported side effects were pain at the injection site, headache, fatigue, muscle aches, and nausea. Most of these occurred within 1-2 days after vaccination, lasted 1-2 days, and were mild to moderate in severity. Some also reported fever, joint pain, and lymph node swelling.

Can I stop wearing a mask, washing hands, and social distancing afterwards?

No.
